Team Retreat - Omanawa



Chaplaincy story, Rotorua, September 2019

On Wednesday afternoon 4 September I was driving across town & several police cars came by. We later learnt that there had been a serious bus accident in the Mamaku's. I was going away out of town for the weekend & had a lot of things to organise. So, I had debated whether I would have enough time to do my usual round on Friday morning in the orthopaedic ward as a VCA. As it turned out, we got packing done early & other things arranged, so I headed off to hospital as per usual.

I took a phone call on arrival in the ward, & no sooner had I hung up when 2 Chinese gentlemen with smiling faces approached me. One of them was the new pastor at the Chinese Fellowship which meet in the Baptist church along with his assistant. They knew who I was. We chatted briefly & I realised that Chinese folk from the bus accident were all in this ward. Then my neighbour turned up who is a lovely Christian Chinese lady that I have supported pastorally over the years. She comes to our church & we have become friends. She had another Chinese woman with her who couldn't speak much English. My friend had been interpreting for her along with other patients from the accident. This lady had been in the accident herself though was only bearing a few scratches. She asked if I could pray for her mother who had gone into surgery. She also told me that she had watched someone die in front of her on the bus. She seemed quite calm, but bewildered & grieving. I prayed & my friend translated. It was a special time together.

Then, they asked if I would go with them into the room where several other injured ladies were.. One lady had rib damage, & other complications, though was mobile. We chatted & I prayed for her as well. She lifted her hands in faith as I prayed, very ready for Divine help. After praying I chatted further & could see dampness in her eyes. I could tell that the Lord was doing something special in her, & she confirmed so. Then, I was led to the lady in the bed opposite her. She had her arm in a sling, though was relatively comfortableDespite some exploration into Buddhism, she was wanting for me, as a Christian to pray for her. It was almost as if there was only one option, & that was to have faith in God, so, she asked me to pray along those lines. I immediately felt a wave of emotion come over myself, privileged to be there in this moment & be a conduit of God's love for these Chinese nationals, so, I prayed that the Lord would touch her, & also the other lady; that they would both know God's salvation in their journey according to His grace. What an incredible privilege.

Then, I approached several of the nursing staff who were at their central station. I have gotten to know them quite well over the years & asked how they were doing with this influx from the accident. They processed & talked with me at length. At one point, I indicated to move on so as not to keep them too long. "Don't go Tim," was their response, so, I continued to listen with interest. One of the nurses is Chinese & she had been doing a lot of valuable interpreting for the patients. She was tired. It was so right that I spent time in the orthopaedic ward that day. I would not have wanted to be anywhere else other than to see God at work in these women whose hearts seemed so soft & ready for a touch from the Lord. And, to see the staff even more engaged than usual was very special. It's all about relationship, & chaplaincy is such a great means to develop that for the sake of God's kingdom, whether with staff or patients.




