

Meet the team – Timothy Lee




The many faces of Rev'd Timothy Lee

Timothy Lee joined our Chaplaincy team in 2016, and has been such a passionate volunteer when it comes to visiting patients, and also a real fun person. We are very blessed to have him on our team, with his wisdom, and the many gifts that he brings. But wait, there is more



On September 13, at the Rotorua Baptist Church, Timothy launched his book "Hopes, Fears and Wheelchairs." He was interviewed by his very lovely sister-in-law (he said his favourite sister-in-law) Cindy, who has also written a book called "Walking Through the Fire."



Timothy started his sharing with the people present at the launch by acknowledging his wife Jenny, who has walked with him on this unplanned journey. People had been asking him since 2010 if he would write a book as it is a unique story that needs to be heard. He hoped that people could relate to his book as we all have troubles, and trauma that we don't expect. These things need not bury us. There is always a means to carry on, things that will get you up in the morning. People in Timothy's community are all part of his journey.

We all have different responses to life and Timothy found ways to know that he can still do stuff, ways to help harness survival strategies, and help with his mental health. We all have strengths and weaknesses and need to acknowledge those things.

When asked if he was always positive, Timothy responded that he gets very frustrated. He would desperately love to help Jenny, love to be able to drive. He relies on help for everything, from loyal and caring people, but it takes away his freedom – he can't pick up his grandson, use tools – these things still hurts.

Grief is a real thing. It triggers. The moment does pass so it is important to do one day at a time, and to be grateful for the small things. Comparison is a dangerous thing; wellbeing and contentment a privilege. Everything counts for something. (Notes from interview with Timothy).

.... a fundraising opportunity by way of a sausage sizzle outside Bunnings - a great way to profile chaplaincy, talk to people and fill their tummies.



A family of 3 generations were grieving the death of a child. They chose one stone for each generation to place together in the urupa at the burial.




Musings from a Volunteer Chaplain

Patient Encounter

I was called to ICU where Ms x was on life support surrounded by whanau and friends. While I was there the medical team came in to explain that Ms x would not survive, and they would need to consider turning off the life support. Although the whanau and friends held no religious beliefs, they knew Ms x was a Christian and were sure she would have wanted a chaplain present. We chatted for some time and then I offered to pray a blessing on Ms x. Once the life support was turned off Ms x died peacefully. Afterwards I reflected on the privilege we have as chaplains, being invited into these places.
